Italy Seizes Textile Apparel Due to High Levels of Chromium (VI)



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EUROPA Consumer Affairs recently reported that Italian authorities seized a variety of textile apparel articles, including embroidered skirts, shirts, and track suits, after finding concentrations of chromium (VI) ("Cr (VI)") from ranging from 2.4 to 19.2 mg/kg. In the past, concerns about chromium (VI) have been limited to leather products. For example, Germany recently limited the concentration of Cr (VI) to no more than 3 ppm, in leather materials on consumer products that have contact with the skin. Other countries in Europe have not followed Germany's lead in restricting Cr (VI); however, the Italian authorities justified the seizures based on prevailing standards for exposure to Cr (VI), determining that a limit of 5 mg/kg of Cr (VI) is a "practical threshold beyond which there is a serious risk of allergic contact dermatitis."

These recent actions are part of a growing trend, requiring companies to test for increasing types of elements in their products. We will continue to keep you apprised of further developments in the U.S. and abroad.
